

and treat the rare inherited disorder earlier than ever before. More important, it will allow development of tests to diagnose noninherited arrhythmias in the general population and use existing treatments more effectively, Bristol-Myers Squibb said.

Unlike Capecchi's financial award, which is intended for personal use, the grant to Keating is meant to help finance research in his laboratory for the next five years.

Capecchi was one of three winners of this year's Kyoto Prizes. The other two also went to Americans: Stanford University's Donald Ervin Knuth for his pioneering work in microcomputing and computer programming, and Harvard University's Willard Van Orman Quine, described as "one of America's pre-eminent 20th century philosophers."

She was recipient of the Susa Young Gates Award. Active in the Democratic Party for many years, she was Secretary, legislative and voting district person, and a member of the Women's Traffic Club. More recently she worked with the City Community Council.

Beatrice is survived by a sister, Arvella Rasmussen; and a brother, Thad Peter Salina; her surviving children are: Wand Rosander, Marva Beth (Roger Davis), Susan Roger (Susan Hemingsen), Herbert Byron (Susan Smith, deceased), and Francis Dwight (Mary Pierce) of Salt Lake City; Elva (Ric Barnes), George P.
