I know he helped organize the Beatrice Creamery, which I believe was the beginning of what is now Beatrice Foods, Inc. of Chicago, a nationally active food manufacturer and distributor. From Beatrice he moved to Hutchinson, Kans, where he was receiver of a defunct railroad. Through good management he reorganized this R.R. and began construction of a major expansion. This attracted the interest of the A.T. & S.F. Ry. Co. and they purchased the Hutchinson Southern R.R., and incorporated it into their system, of which it is still an integral part. They did this because it appeared that if extended as planned by my father it would have provided substantial competition to the Santa Fed So to prevent this they bought it. My father was president of 3 other railroads in Texas and Oklahoma before his death in Austin . Texas, in 1919. (over)

My mother came to the U.S. with her family from France about 1867. Her father had been a school teacher. They lived in St. Denis, a suburb of Paris. My Grandfather Leger was concerned over the liklihood of another war between France and Prussia, and he did not wish his sons to become "cannon fodder" in another European war. He was correct because the Franco-Prussian war broke out in 1870. They first settled in Illinois, where my few Grandfather Leger became a farmer. Later they moved to Nebraska. My mother received enough education to qualify for a teacher's certificate and she taught school in the elementary grades for 15 years before she married my father subsequent to the death of his first wife.

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My Father and Mother established their home in Austin, Texas in 1907 (when I was 10 years old). My mother survived my father several years and finally died at age 89 in 1948, and is buried with my father in Austin. Our family home in Austin, originally constructed in 1895 is still in practically 100% condition, and is a landmark in Austin. My mother lived in this hous from 1914 when it was purchased until her death in 1948, a total of 38 years.

I am the only surviving member of my family, and am now in my 82nd year. I am active, in good health, walk about 2 miles a day, csrry on a small hobby/craft enterprise, manufacturing name necklaces (which are of my own design) and personalized key rings.

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
